#### Best Practice: 1

##### Title 1: HYMN HUMANITY: Chords to Conquer

- Goal:** As an institution, SIES ASCN aims at inculcating values of social responsibility in its students, in addition to the academic knowledge imparted to them. To achieve the same, the College encourages the students to organize and participate in various social outreach programmes. Accordingly, students and faculty of each department undertake to launch a socially committed initiative from time to time, one of them being the Hymn Humanity Project.
- Context:** The Hymn Humanity Project was devised as a social outreach programme by the Department of Mass Media (BMM) to give expression to the Institutional Social Responsibility of the SIES Management. Conceived in the academic year 2016-17, the Project aimed at creating a music band comprising of talents from SIES, which would subsequently perform to raise funds for the social causes undertaken by the Management. In addition, it was to provide a platform for the students – both alumni and existing ones – to showcase their talent as musicians after a reasonable training session under a professional. Thus, the project was designed to benefit the students, the needy and society at large through the healing power of music.

### 3. Objectives:

- (i) To recognize and advocate Institutional Social Responsibility
- (ii) To challenge the disparities in the society and uphold the spirit of cooperative living in a society
- (iii) To develop an empathetic attitude in the students towards the underprivileged sections of the society.
- (iv) To nurture the creative talents of the students

4. **The Practice:** The students of BMM Department were entrusted with the digital promotion of the project Hymn Humanity. Accordingly, the students began with deliberations about the logo and tag line and after short listing several options, they arrived at a logo comprising of a tricoloured Mandala and the tag line “Chords to Conquer”; the Mandala symbolizing the never ending cycle of life with its three representative colours green (for love), blue (for inner peace) and yellow (for learning and wisdom) along with the tag line defined the thought behind the Hymn Humanity project – that of blending music and social reforms on a mutually beneficial platform. In addition, the students also designed a website for Hymn Humanity (<http://www.hymnhumanity.org/>) to create awareness about the initiative and win external support for the same.

Having laid the groundwork, the students then visited the Goethegaon School as part of the programme and captured the mindscapes of the young children on their camera further shaping it into a video the showcased the beauty of their aspirations and dreams. Further, the students uploaded the same on You-tube ([https://youtu.be /QHiYLR-wAMMERMM](https://youtu.be/QHiYLR-wAMMERMM)) as well as the official website of Hymn Humanity (<https://youtu.be/AnYr405>)with a view of sensitizing the students of SIES and the society towards their concerns. Finally, in order to achieve the true purpose of forming a music band, the student volunteers provided assistance in conducting auditions at various institutions of SIES, and the musicians thus finalized were trained by Mr. Haroon Hanif, an SIES Alumni who studied music at AR Rahman’s Academy.

Conclusively, the band Hymn Humanity was launched on 15<sup>th</sup> of August, 2017 receiving overwhelming support for its performance from the audience at Shanmukhananda Hall in Matunga, Mumbai. Further, the band performed on the 25<sup>th</sup> of February, 2018. Following its initial success, this endeavour initiated by the Department of Mass Media (BMM), SIES Nerul was adopted by the entire community of SIES.

5. **Evidence of Success:** The entire process fulfilled the objective of making the students more responsible and empathetic towards society. This was evidenced in newfound enthusiasm for socially relevant activities in the students of BMM after the success and fruition of the Hymn Humanity Project. Also, the money raised from the Hymn Humanity band performances along with the sponsorships from SIES Management was utilized in the development of infrastructure of Goethegaon School. The inauguration of the same is scheduled in the month of October 2018. Lastly, the program was successful in identifying and encouraging music talents from SIES (Nerul), SIES (SION, East and West) ,SIES School, Matunga in the form of vocalists, composers, and instrumentalists. However, the most gratifying part of the programme was empowering several visually impaired students by including them in the band and celebrating their music skills at par with others truly realizing the idea of **Hymn Humanity**.

## **Best Practice: 2**

### **Title 1: Cumulative Learning and Skill Development Practices**

**1. Goal:** Being a nodal centre of various academic programmes, the College insists on tailoring the teaching learning methods as per the requirements of each discipline of study with the holistic development of its students in view. Accordingly, it conceptualizes educative platforms that augment the intellectual as well as the professional skills of the students during the course of an under graduate and/or post graduate programme, thereby conforming to its mission - “Rise with Education”.

**2. Context:** Considering that the College admits students from vernacular and non-vernacular backgrounds, it becomes imperative to impart knowledge in a student friendly manner. Accordingly, the student centred framework adopted by the College includes practices like: Interactive Learning, Participatory Learning, ICT Enabled Teaching, and Innovative Practices of Teaching. All of these bring about an all-encompassing growth in the student’s knowledge acquisition and performance levels.

The basis of **Interactive Learning** is the policy of positive discrimination, whereby the students are grouped as per their strengths and weaknesses so that they can be guided by the teachers and industry experts to enhance their potential further. Thus, the motive of this



practise is to cater to individual students and their respective concerns. This method also ensures to increasingly set difficult benchmarks for students and undertakes to equip them to overcome their challenges at every level, and ultimately boost their self-confidence.

The essence of **Participatory Learning** is to actively engage the students in the learning process instead of being a passive recipient; it enables to break the monotony of classroom teaching and to promote the idea of learning through participation. Further, it enables the students to develop professional as well as soft skills that meet native and international industry standards.

Considering the needs of the young generation growing in the age of globalization, the implementation of **ICT Enabled Teaching Learning** becomes an imperative need based transformation. Therefore, the College encourages the use of technological audio-visual aids and a global connectivity through internet in classroom teaching. This again serves as an effort to achieve the idea of learner centred education by allowing an extensive access to information within and beyond classroom, and from library as well as web resources to both the teacher and the students. Such a method of teaching learning is advantageous in not only upgrading the recipient but also that of the gatekeepers of knowledge – the teachers.

### **3. Objectives:**

- i) To adopt and encourage a ‘You Attitude’ in teaching learning**
- ii) To achieve improved levels of knowledge acquisition and skill development in students through innovative methods of teaching learning**
- iii) To provide platforms of experiment and exhibition to students**
- iv) To shape students into individuals of positive character and optimum potential**

### **4. The Practice:**

**Interactive Learning:** This practise focuses on developing the intellectual skills of the students. Some of the methods under this practise emphasize on a student-teacher equation, while a few others on a student-student one. For instance, Bridge Course is an initiative that enables to bridge the gap between the academically weak and strong students by resolving the subject specific problems of the former. This is achieved in two ways: primarily with the teacher – student interaction, and also with bright student – weak student interaction. Further, classroom sessions involving problem solving between student clusters of the aforesaid nature also allows a weaker pupil to acquire knowledge through cooperative learning. Similarly, Intensive Coaching is another approach to address the subject specific issues of

the students. In the same vein, sessions by industry experts are also provided on career guidance, UPSC competitive examinations, and MBA coaching. Apart from the above, initiatives like academically oriented guest lectures, seminars, workshops are also conducted to expose the students to advanced levels of information thereby broadening their horizons.

**Participatory Learning:** This method emphasizes on developing the professional skills of the students whereby they undergo a complete personality transformation acquiring leadership, linguistic, persuasive, and other soft skills, apart from acquiring information. To begin with, the Departmental Fests that are purely designed on the basis of course contents insists the engagement of students as organizers, performers as well as audience. This becomes a creative platform of learning that encourages students to transform classroom knowledge into games, exhibits, business schemes, and other expressions of their imagination. Such fest like Frames - an international film festival - organised by Department of Mass Media on film making; Sharpshooters organised by the Department of Management Studies on management games and business quiz; Renegade and Technovision organised by Computer Science and Information Technology Department on IT topics, all add to the student centred scheme of teaching learning. Besides this, the students are also encouraged to take up live projects in the area of finance, marketing, insurance, journalism and IT under the guidance of teachers. Further, the interdepartmental debate competition like Expressions brings student groups together whereby they research on subject specific debate topics selected by the teacher, and gain knowledge about current market conditions and their implications in real life. Further, in courses like BMM and BMS, industry oriented case studies are incorporated as a part of teaching learning which invites inputs from the students and acts effectively on their problem solving skills. Likewise, students of courses like B.Com, BAF, and BBI hold exhibitions on various topics like Investment, Insurance and Merger and Acquisition through PPTs and charts. Students of B.Sc.C.S and BSc IT participate in Avishkar – an intercollegiate Research competition conducted by University of Mumbai. Also, Alta Performers are an event where advanced learners compete through poster competition, and in turn teach a subject to the class under the supervision of the faculty. Further, Role Plays are also used in the class to generate interest in the course content among students. Alongside these academic endeavours, the College also undertakes a number of extension programs under NSS, Rotract Club, DLLE whereby students organise as well as participate in socially committed programs like Swatch Bharat Abhiyaan, Blood Donation Camps, and Social Awareness Initiatives including skits, rallies, as well as

donations and volunteering for NGOs. Thus, Participatory Learning aids acquisition of knowledge through practical exercises.

### **ICT Enabled Teaching Learning:**

Considering the paradigm shift in teaching methodologies, the College organizes workshops for teachers to upgrade their knowledge and the means to impart it. It also encourages the faculty to develop reading material and other such learning contents for students including Power Point Presentations and Tutorial Videos. To ensure results in this area, the College organized workshops on e- Content Development, Advanced Excel, SPSS and AMOS in Research, and also training sessions on use of Google Classroom to share the web resources developed by them. In addition to these, the College also supports the faculty in arranging online lectures and the lecture series by Dr. Manu Vohra was a result of such efforts.

**Innovative methods:** Innovation is essential to perpetuate the success of survival for an academic institution, especially for one which deals with a student population coming from diverse backgrounds. Therefore, the College introduces new techniques of augmenting the performance of its students through activities inside and outside the classroom. Some of the innovative practices adopted in the College are Open Book Test, Subject-wise Semester Assignments, and Class Presentations; each of these familiarizes the students with the contents of their study material at regular intervals preparing them for the Semester End Examinations in advance. Further, the students are trained in certain professional areas through regular college activities. For instance, students of BMM are included in designing the College Magazine or covering the College events training them in advertising, reporting, photography and videography; managing the college website and designing the feedback software of the College gave hands-on training to the students of IT. To add to this, the College also allows for learning beyond the campus through field visits to institutions like SEBI, RBI, IT industries to provide practical exposure to students. Drawing from these experiences, the students then submit reports highlighting the knowledge gained thereby and also partake in a classroom discussion based on the same. Also, the College associates with external educational centres to bring professional courses to the campus at a subsidized cost through the Add-on Committee of the College. Accordingly, courses in Tally, TCS, Training for BPO, SAP

Along with these, the College also believes in imparting value education to the students to make them more empathetic to the needs of the underprivileged. Accordingly, all the

departments conduct social outreach program as part of their extracurricular activity from time to time; some of them being Awareness Programme on Mobile Addiction (B.Com), Bike Rally Promoting Road Safety (BBI), Rally in Support of Differently Abled People (BFM & BBI), Self Defence Programme for Girls (BMS).

## **5. Evidence of Success:**

The Teaching –Learning scheme focusing on the above discussed four fronts has been enriching at the Institutional level; it is particularly so, in familiarizing the students with the recent changes in the academic and professional front. Also, the success of this learner centric approach is testified by the performance of the students at Inter-collegiate events as well as University Examinations with most of the courses achieving passing standards over 90%. Further, the ultimate sign of success of all these schemes are seen in the number of campus recruitments that take place every year. During the academic year 2017-18, over 100 students from the College were placed in companies like L&T Infotech, Infosys, Maxval Technologies, and Axis securities.

Thus, the Student centric approach of the institution leads its pupils to the best of their potentials through a cumulative learning and skill development process. Beginning at the First Year level of Undergraduate programme, such attempts bear fruits not just at the end of graduation or post-graduation, but continue to show effect in producing professionally established alumni. Owing to the commitment of the College in shaping the lives of its students through education, the knowledge, skills and values inculcated in them distinguishes their professional trajectory from that of others.
